Timetable

PE and Swimming Days

- In all of Autumn Term and Summer 2 - Outdoor PE will be on a Thursday and Indoor PE will be on Wednesday.
- **Children are expected to wear their PE kit to school on PE days, longhair must be tied up and all jewellery must be removed.**

Swimming

- Swimming for Y5 will be at Crown Pools and be in Spring Term and Summer 1.
- Boys will need a towel, trunks and a hat; girls will need a one-piece costume, towel and a hat. After a number of weeks, the children will need an additional t-shirt and shorts to put over the top of their trunks or costumes.



The school day

- The gates open at 8:25am.
- Children can come into school from 8:35am.
- The gates close at 8:45am
- Break time will be at 10:30am to 10:50 and lunchtime will be from 12:30pm - 1:25pm.
- The school day will finish at 3:15pm.
- Children will come into school and leave through the KS2 gate and enter our classrooms by the relevant fire doors.



Attendance and Punctuality

Good attendance and punctuality is a skill for life and the best way to embed this skill in our children is to promote high expectations as soon as they start school.

When we are thinking about attendance, '**Helping Each Other to Aim High**' means that we all aspire for our children to be in school, on time, ready to learn each day. We encourage our pupils and their families to aspire for 100% punctuality and attendance. We will update you each week on how we're doing.

Did you know that children are only in school for 190 days a year? This means there is a lot of learning that we need to fit in, so every minute counts.

This also means that there are 175 days that your child is not in school. Time which can be used for holidays, routine dental and medical appointments, visits to family, renewing documentation.

In most areas of life a score of 80% or 90% would be considered good or even excellent, but not when it comes to school attendance.

We have all seen first hand the impact that lost learning time has on our children's progress, so ***let's help each other to aim for 100% attendance.***

If you have concerns about your child's attendance and would like to discuss these, please speak to your child's class teacher in the first instance.



Our School Uniform

At Halifax Primary School we promote an atmosphere which encourages aspiration, nurture, collaboration and curiosity. We have high expectations for all children in terms of their learning and behaviour. These high expectations are also reflected in the pride we take in our school uniform and the feeling of belonging it creates.

We believe that a school uniform:

- promotes a sense of pride in the school;
- engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school;
- is practical and smart;
- identifies the children with the school;
- makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance;
- is good value for money;
- is designed with health and safety in mind



Our School Uniform (continued)

For Every Day:

- Royal blue sweatshirt or cardigan – optional with school logo from PMG Schoolwear (not to be worn around the waist)
- Grey or Black school trousers (not leggings or cropped trousers)
- Grey or Black shorts (tailored and knee length)
- Grey or Black skirt (knee length) or pinafore dress
- White or pale blue polo shirt
- Blue gingham dress, playsuit, shorts or culottes
- White, grey or black socks
- White, grey, black or navy tights
- All black, flat, sensible footwear only (trainers, ankle boots or shoes)
- Weatherproof coat

For PE:

- Black or navy shorts – sports shorts or cycling short just above the knee
- White t-shirt - optional with school logo from PMG Schoolwear
- Plimsolls or trainers
- Plain black or navy jogging bottoms and a plain black or navy jogging top.

Please note that to help families minimise the cost of uniform and ensure equality for all pupils, we will not accept branded sports items as part of the PE uniform.



Our School Uniform (continued)

For Forest School:

- Waterproof jacket and trousers
(Early Years, Year 1 and Year 2 provided by school)
- Long sleeved top (even in warmer weather)
- Trousers (even in warmer weather)
- Jumper
- Wellies
- Spare socks and trainers are required to wear in school
- Hat, scarf and gloves (in colder weather)
- Sun hat (in warmer weather)

For Swimming:

- Swimming suit (one piece not bikini) or close fitting swimming trunks
- Swimming cap
- Towel

Year 5 & 6 pupils will need to bring shorts and a t-shirt for life saving.

For health and safety reasons, please ensure that earrings are removed for PE and Swimming days and long hair is tied back.



Curriculum

- **Autumn term – ‘World War 2’**
 - We will be learning about World War 2: placing this in the context of conflict in history and then thinking about how it started, key people and key events.
- **Spring term– ‘Exploring Ipswich’**
 - We will look at the area around us, in more detail, understanding key people, places and events.
- **Summer term – ‘Ancient Greece’**
 - We will apply all our learning of historical skills, using sources of information, to explore Ancient Greece.



Approaches to behaviour at Halifax

At Halifax, we understand behaviour as a learning process. Children will push limits, boundaries, and societal norms as part of their development.

Children may also react in different ways to stress, lack of understanding, over-excitement, and disappointment. Our staff view behaviour mistakes as inevitable. This means that we offer support, help and guidance to our pupils so they can learn from these mistakes and improve for next time.

As part of our wider curriculum, we teach our pupils what it means to be respectful, responsible, safe and caring. We use these terms to challenge unwanted behaviour using restorative conversations.



Working together to support children's behaviour in school

At school we will:

- › Create a calm and safe environment for pupils
- › Establish and maintain clear boundaries of acceptable pupil behaviour
- › Implement the behaviour policy consistently
- › Communicate the school's expectations, routines, values and standards through teaching behaviour and in every interaction with pupils
- › Model expected behaviour and positive relationships
- › Provide a personalised approach to the specific behavioural needs of particular pupils
- › Record behaviour incidents promptly
- › Challenge pupils to meet the school's expectations

We ask that parents and carers support by:

- › Getting to know the school's behaviour policy and reinforce it at home where appropriate
- › Supporting their child in adhering to the school's behaviour policy
- › Informing the school of any changes in circumstances that may affect their child's behaviour
- › Discussing any behavioural concerns with the class teacher promptly
- › Taking part in any pastoral work following misbehaviour (for example, attending reviews of behaviour plans)
- › Raise any concerns about behaviour management directly with the school, and not in the presence of their child, while continuing to work in partnership with us.



Year group expectations

Our school rules (**Be Safe, Be Responsible, Be Respectful and Be Caring**) frame our high expectations in Year 5.

- With the children, we will decide on expectations that are consistent across the year group, regardless of room or adults.
- We have high expectations of them to set an example to the younger children.
- The children will be expected to show effort, resilience, pride and a positive attitude to their learning.
- We expect honesty and politeness at all times – this includes going on holiday – they will tell us so please be courteous as we just care about the wellbeing of the children.
- We have a **zero tolerance** policy on lack of respect from both children and parents – please imbed this at home – at school this will result in the use of the tracker in line with the school’s behaviour policy.



Trips & Residential Visits

In terms of residential, our current plan is that the children will have an overnight trip at Hallowtree towards the end of June–25th/26th.

As part of our work to provide an engaging curriculum, we endeavour to provide a range of trips and experiences to enrich the learning of all of our pupils.

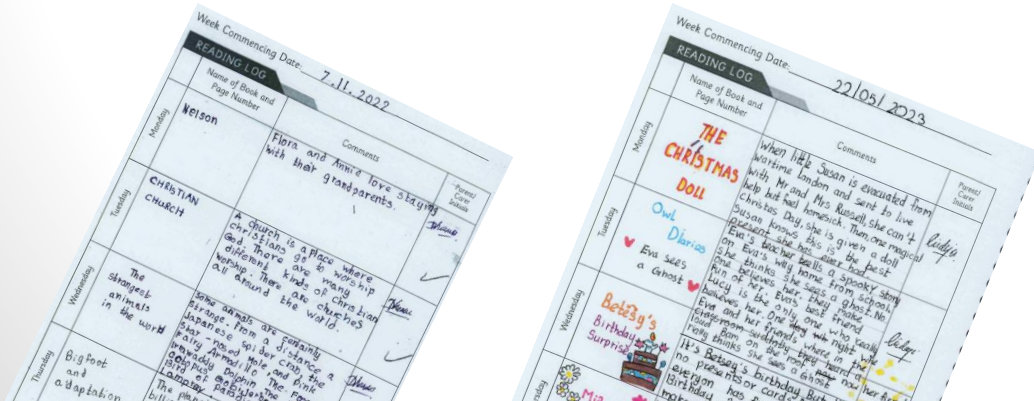
As you can appreciate, the provision of these events does involve a significant amount of additional planning and costings and we will always strive to provide as much notice as possible to gain consent, deposits and balance payments. Therefore, in order to help us continue to provide these experiences, deadlines for consent and payment must be met.



Homework expectations

What and When?

- A minimum of 5 reads each week, with a detailed comment written by the child and signed by an adult.
 - Reads will be checked every Monday.
- Spelling practise in preparation for a spelling test on Fridays.
 - New spellings will be shared via Class Dojo on Fridays and tested the following Friday.
- Regular practise of times tables and associated division facts.
- In the Summer term, an extra piece of homework to consolidate learning.



Homework is important to consolidate in-school learning. When homework is not handed in, late or incomplete, consequences may be given.



Helping your child

- It's the usual!
- Early nights, supporting at home with reads, restricting technology if it distracts...
- Times table results for this year group are not as successful as we would like, we need your help to increase this at home.
- We understand this can sometimes be hard – especially the early nights – but it really does help the children's frame of mind in school.
